GSE TEAM TO BRAZIL

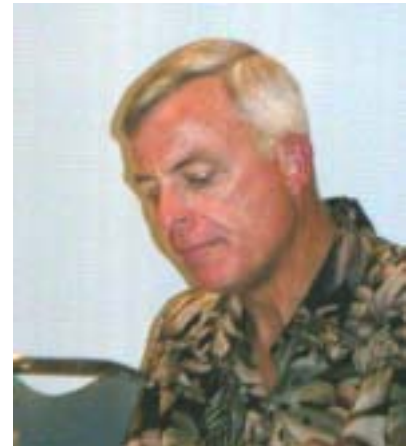

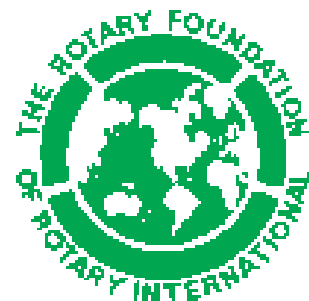

Incorporated in the State of Hawaii as a non-profit corporation on September 3, 1976 with M. J. Sullivan as its president.

The first scholarship was granted in the fall of 1977, in the amount of \$3,500. Since then, 742 scholars have shared in \$2,245,730. Scholarships in the fall of 2001 found ninety six scholars sharing in a total of \$294,000.

HRYF remains today as a legacy of Maurice J Sullivan's and his belief in the free enterprise system. It is a leg-up for those who strive to succeed.
