The original Rotary Club was organized in Chicago by Paul P. Harris, a lawyer. Rotary is the oldest service club and the first meeting was held on February 23, 1905.

The name "Rotary" was chosen because the club then met in rotation at each member's place of business.

From the beginning, the Rotary idea of friendship, fellowship, and service to other has spread to six continents with more than 26,000 clubs and over one million members. Still, only one person in every five thousand is a member of a Rotary Club.

Every Rotarian has the privilege and obligation of seeking qualified members. In this way, all club members can help their clubs achieve a full representation of the business and professional life of the community.
