MEMBERSHIP MINUTE "WHAT DOES ROTARY MEAN TO ME?" BOB LUNDY

I was raised in Tupelo, Mississippi but since Elvis was eight years older, he was the very famous home town hero during my high school days. In 1959, I fell in love with Hawaii as I traveled to and from the Philippines to attend the 10th Boy Scout World Jamboree. Two years later, I drove Route 66 from Tupelo to Long Beach in my 1961 Plymouth "Fury" convertible to start my college days at the University of Hawaii. In 1964, I graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree and a major in Economics. Being an independent fellow with a love of speed, I joined Honolulu Ford to sell cars and two years later, joined the team of my Ford client Honolulu Roofing as an estimator. By 1972 I was the Manager of the Honolulu Roofing Department and ready for a challenge, so I moved to the brand new Kama'aina Roofing Company. In 1975, I partnered with Fred Hemmings to create the International Professional Surfing Tour (IPS), the first world professional surfing tour. I traveled to South Africa, South America, Australia and New Zealand to coordinate all the details of worldwide surfing. In 1976, my entrepreneurial spirit motivated me to get a real estate license, become an independent roofing consultant and oversee the re-roofing of the Ala Moana Center Phase I roof. In 1979, I became the Construction Manager for Hawaiian Land and the Dillingham Corporation, but in 1984 that entrepreneurial bug bit me again and I became a General Contractor and obtained a Commercial real estate license. I'm still surfing and hanging loose, but by 1986 I had developed and leased the 8,000 square foot "The Food Court" at Windward Mall. Finally, Rotary comes into my life from my client Stanley Togikawa, who invited me to lunch in 1987. Rotary to me is the opportunity to give back to my community and my Hawaii home based on the leadership of Sully Sullivan and the exciting future HRYF gives to our young people. As a Boy Scout, I fell in love with Hawaii and as a Rotarian, I am happy to give back to our youth and support their educational futures.

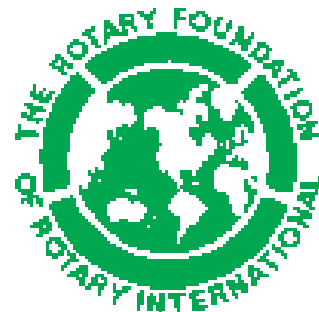

The cost for this project will be US\$50,000. Any money raised over that amount will be forwarded to The Rotary Foundation. Dedication is planned for mid-2004.

It is time, once again, to submit the names of candidates for our District Governor Nominee. This time, the individual selected will serve during the 2006-2007 Rotary year. General information is offered below and full instructions and additional information can be located in your Manual of Procedure.

At this time, we are asking each Rotary Club in District 5000 to search out and nominate one of their own for the position of District Governor for the Rotary Year 2006-2007. The President of each club must take a proactive role in this process.

Certainly, the role of District Governor is challenging; it's also exciting and rewarding. The role of District Governor is also one that requires extensive training and experience. The year 2006 may seem a long way in the future but in terms of the development and training of District Leadership this time line is essential.

The nomination process and key qualifications for a District Governor applicant are:

Nomination of candidates must be made by a District 5000 Rotary Club.

At the time of taking office a Governor must have completed seven years of membership in one or more Rotary clubs and have attended the International Assembly for its full duration.

The Nominee must have served as President of a Rotary Club for a full one year term and be a current member, other than honorary, in good standing.

The Nominee must have the ability and commitment to perform the duties and meet the responsibilities of the job.

I'm sure that there are Rotarians in every club meeting these basic criteria. The District needs these leaders. As President of your Rotary Club, we need your assistance in seeking out these qualified Rotarians encouraging them to apply; perhaps you may be interested. The completed Governor Nominee Data form (application) is to be sent to the Chair of the Nominating Committee, PDG Roy King, no later than April 15, 2004. Sooner is better. The other members of the Committee are PDG's Dick Mosko, Linda Coble, Hal Darcey and Bob Pennington as per our District Policy Manual & Leadership Plan . Each nomination must be accompanied by a Resolution of approval and support by your Board of Directors.

Your Rotary Club resolution can be in a letter format. The Governor Nominee Data form and the Statement of Qualifications for a Candidate for District Governor, 2006-2007 are on the District 5000 web site www.rotaryd5000.org Please contact me, or any of the committee members, at any time for information or assistance.
