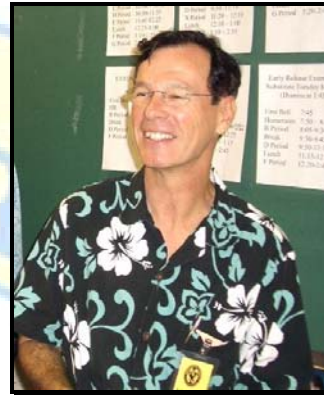
Quad-Athlete XI: Past-President Scott O'Brien did the honors this week! I'm not sure if my memory serves me, but did Scott do this before?

Guest Speaker: Jim Fitzpatrick from Public Storage Inc and his architect, Lloyd Sueda from Sueda & Associates spoke to our club today.

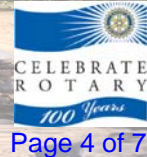


L-R: Lloyd Sueda & Jim Fitzpatrick, with Scott O'Brien.

According to our Jim, Public Storage, Inc. was founded in 1972, and started to be

publicly traded in 1978. They have 1,410 properties in 37 states. They entered the Hawaii market with three initial properties. Since then, they have added three more properties and are currently planning a new property on the corner of Kapiolani Boulevard and Kamakehe Street (near Craig's carwash).

Jim said that this new property fits into its intended neighborhood very well, especially with all the current residential development going on there. Their facility will also not impact the traffic much, and it will have a "retail" storefront component. The planned development is will be 5-stories by 170, 000 sq. ft., and will be about 54 feet tall. The architecture will be "territorial" with arches, crown molding, and the like.

The new property is at the "gateway" to Ward Center. Public Storage, Inc. is also trying to be a good neighbor by working with the neighborhood board, community associations, and the Housing and Community Development Authority (HCDA). They also engaged the services of an archaeologist to make sure there are no native Hawaiian burials on their site.

As for Public Storage, Inc.'s clients, the average stay is between 8 and 10 months. About 95 percent of their clientele are residential customers. Each customer supplies their own locking device, but Public Storage Inc.'s units are made to "double lock". Each unit has it's own security system and there is cameral surveillance throughout the facility. They staff three full-time managers and three part-time managers. The managers physically check each lock at least once per day.

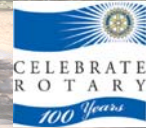

October - Vocational Service

The Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions was adopted by the Rotary International Council on Legislation in 1989 to provide more specific guidelines for the high ethical standards called for in the Object of Rotary:

As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

**Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;

**Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;

**Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;

**Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;

**Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;

**Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;

**Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;

**Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

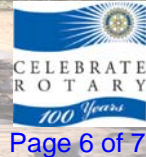

One Final Message from PDG Linda Coble Prior to Election Day

Aloha Oahu Kids Voting Hawaii Chairs,

Mahalo for your dedication and attention to Kids Voting Hawaii. I know it has been difficult without an Oahu coordinator, but I want to thank you for your help throughout the downloading, and delivery of student voter registration cards and promotion of Kids Voting Hawaii. All schools in your complexes should have the registration cards by now. **This message addressed the next step.....November 2nd.**

I have mailed 'I VOTED' stickers to neighbor island club presidents. I have others I will try to get to most of you by Nov. 2nd. Call me if you want them, and we can discuss drop-offs. They are to be used November 2nd, at the polling site you will staff for Kids Voting Hawaii. These were the leftovers from the mainland sticker stock...I got as many as I could. Please share them with the kids who come in to vote November 2nd.

<<Linda will drop off the stickers at the front desk of the Ala Moana Hotel, so we should be able to get these to the first group of volunteers by our Thursday meeting – Hubert and Richard>>

We cannot predict how many students will walk in to vote on November 2nd. But Rotarians will be there, to plug the cracks. If a student comes to a polling site November 2nd without a student voter registration card number...not to worry.

By Thursday afternoon, Bob Lew and I will e-mail to each Rotary Club KVH Chair a private list of 100 student voter registration card numbers that students, coming in November 2nd without school issued cards, may use. This is merely a list of numbers...not registration cards. You will DOWNLOAD AND PRINT THIS LIST OF NUMBERS AND HAVE IT AVAILABLE FOR FIRST SHIFT NOVEMBER 2ND. On Tuesday, check off the number issued ... hand the kid the number...and let him/her have at the computer. I suggest bringing some note cards, to copy the number and hand it to the kid to take with him/her to computer...and then check off that you used up that number. Help younger ones add precinct and district numbers. If you don't know how that is done...ask me before November 2nd, contact Bob Lew, or

explore the www.kidsvotinghawaii.org website yourself, and see how it's done! Of course, this does not affect kids who show you their teacher-issued KVH student voter registration card they got at school. Please let them use that number, if they have it, and ask them to log in their own district and precinct numbers. **<<I'll download the numbers when I receive them, and give it to the first group of volunteers – Hubert and Richard>>**

The students who walk in to vote November 2nd at a high school or at any other designated KVH polling site, and who are given a token number from you list, will be tallied with all other students voting on-site that day. We are calling that tally Election Day School. Their votes WILL BE COUNTED IN THE KVH TOTAL. KIDS VOTING HAWAII results will be announced in the media and on the www.kidsvotinghawaii.org website, as soon as the last adult polling site closes. All we have to do is push a button :)

On the Oahu, these high schools will NOT be November 2nd KVH polling sites....Nanakuli High, Pearl City High, Waialua High and Waianae High. This is because they are not adult polling sites. Doreen Higa of Pearlridge is working to secure Momilani Elementary as an alternate for Pearl City High....Sandra Maloney of Waianae Rotary is working on Waianae Intermediate....I have asked Dave Bramlett at Wahiawa Waialua to find a Waialua High substitute, and Mike Klein of Honolulu Sunset Rotary is asking Nanaikapono to serve as Nanakuli High substitute KVH POLLING SITE. My job, is to work with the Office of Elections to alert precinct workers at alternate sites that KVH will be moved from high schools to those locations, as soon as they are identified. Please work ASAP, to get me the update.

You all will be asked to introduce yourselves before 7 a.m. to the polling place officials, and let them know where you are located on the school campus. Believe me, parents will ask them...and they need to know. Thank you for getting those sites to me ASAP.

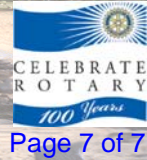
Rotary Club KVH Chairs are asked to post directional signs showing the students the way to the KVH polling site, if it is somewhere other than the same room/cafeteria where adults are voting.

An adult Rotarian should be on hand at each shift. KVH polling site times November 2nd mimic the adult voting times...7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. **Please work with your high school (or alternate site) to shore up the set up in advance.**

A Kids Voting Hawaii banner should be hung on an outside public school fence with high volume drive-by

traffic by now. If you haven't hung the sign...please work with the appropriate school and do so NOW. Encourage kids to create their own signs to hype the KVH on-line balloting. Involve your Interact Clubs ! They can help get to the kids at the lower grades and post signs ! Please contact every school contact you have and school principals to encourage them to distribute the student voter registration cards you have delivered, if they have not yet done so. SO...HOW WOULD YOU KNOW HOW THE SCHOOLS IN YOUR COMPLEX ARE DONG ????????

We will send each KVH Chair a report of how many students at the schools within your complex have voted by mid-week. So far more than 33-thousand public (and a some private school) students have voted on line.

When you get the list, please see how your schools are doing, and encourage your schools to get with the program, if it is obvious they are not yet involved in KVH. Of course, it is up to each school to decide whether to participate. We can only encourage participation, as Rotary volunteers. We cannot bully...just encourage support and the joy of experiencing democracy first hand.

I have contacted all local TV stations and Advertiser and Star Bulletin reporters to cover Kids Voting. We have had a story in the Advertiser, a story in the Star Bulletin of Campbell High students voting, a KGMB story of Campbell, and a KHON story of Mililani Ike voter rally. All have been asked to cover this Wednesday's big KVH rally at Le Jardin Academy. If you have friends in the media, please encourage them to do stories, if they have not already done so. Please share the basic information.

I am home after 3:30 afternoon on Tuesday, in the morning before 10:30 on Wednesday, and after 10:30 Friday morning should you need to reach me this week...988-0404, or cell 284-2000. 01- 07 November - World Interact Week

Interact is Rotary International's service club for young people ages 14-18. Interact clubs are sponsored by individual Rotary clubs, which provide support and guidance, but Interact clubs are self-governing and self-supporting.

Club membership varies greatly. Clubs can be single-gender or mixed, as well as large and small. The membership base can be drawn from the student body of a single school or from two or more schools from the same community.

Each year, Interact clubs complete at least two community service projects, one of which furthers international understanding and goodwill. Through projects, Interactors develop a network of friendships with local and overseas clubs. And, in the process, Interactors develop leadership skills and learn the value of hard work.

As one of the most significant and fastest-growing programs of Rotary service, with more than 8,600 Interact clubs in some 110 countries and geographical areas, Interact has become a worldwide phenomenon.

Interactors also often spearhead the formation of Rotaract clubs and participate in Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA). Interactors also often go on to become Youth Exchange students or Ambassadorial Scholars.
